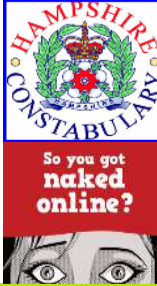

Sexting..... 'Do you know the risks?'

What is Sexting? It's when naked, semi-naked or sexual pictures are sent to others on devices like smartphones, tablets or laptops. Known also as nudes, hot-shots, sex pics, pic 4 pic or other names mentioning certain body parts!!



Do you know the risks?

1. It's illegal: to create or share a nude/sexual pic or video of someone U18 is against the law, even if its of yourself:

- * Police have the power to seize and destroy your phone, tablet or laptop
- * Your details will be held on a police record and could be disclosed in the future

Don't get your mates into trouble.. Did you that if you share a picture of someone with your mates they could also get into trouble as well for having it on their phone too!!

2. Bullying: Some people are bullied when pictures of them leak out to people they know; bullies try to shame and embarrass them and give them a bad name.

3. Blackmail or unwanted attention from strangers or sexual predators: police have seen an increase in a crime called 'sextortion' - criminals trick people into sexual acts in front of a webcam, record it without them knowing and then use the video to blackmail/demand money, threatening to send it to everyone you know.

4. Affect on mental health: All of the risks above can have an affect on how you feel, victims feel worried to tell the police or their parents for fear of getting into trouble.

Tell someone! Don't worry!! If you're being bullied or pressured to send pics, get help!! Contact the site to remove it, speak to the police trusted adult or Childline. Links to more advice and support is available in the section below!

Crime Prevention Advice: Shop-Safe-Online



Are you doing your Christmas shopping online??

Buying online is a modern and convenient way to shop without having to queue up or travel, tempting us all in with cheaper online prices as well.. but how do we know we are getting a genuine bargain and won't be left out of pocket or a victim of crime?

If you're thinking of doing your shopping online make sure you think about these points:

1. Is the site a real store and do the goods really exist?

Advice to you... Google the company name and look at reviews – this tells you loads about a companies reputation, what they are like and how good the products really are.

2. Don't follow links to websites contained in emails!!

Advice to you.... even if the offer seems too good to miss – these could be phishing emails designed to make you click on malicious links which have bad intentions!!

3. When paying for goods make sure the link to the site is secure!!

Advice to you.... you will notice the 'http' at the start of the address bar, when it is secure, it becomes 'https' and a padlock symbol appears. If this is not there, don't add any of your details!!

4. If an offer seems ridiculously cheaper than anywhere else be cautious!!

Advice to you.... the items are highly likely to be fake or may not even exist! Criminals take payment and never send the goods as they never had them to begin with! #scam
